Committee Chair Merrill Matthews said, "The U.S. has one of the highest maternal mortality rates among developed economies. And Texas, with its high rate of uninsured and large rural population, along with extensive maternity health care deserts, faces even greater challenges than most states. The Texas Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will look into these challenges with the goal of recommending ways the state can improve maternal mortality rates among lower-income, minority, rural and underserved populations."

The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, established by the Civil Rights Act of 1957, is the only independent, bipartisan agency charged with advising the President and Congress on civil rights and reporting annually on federal civil rights enforcement.
