. 9	and updates to the July 26th, 2024 advisory opinion,

21	Justice's Office of Legal Counsel. The memo
22	specifically addresses the changes to the Federal
23	Advisory Committee Act regulations, and reaffirms the
24	authority of Commissioners to appoint and vote for SAC

members by majority vote under Administrative

Instruction 5-9.

A discussion and vote on the fiscal year 2026 statutory enforcement report topic on antisemitism on college campuses, co-led by Commissioners Jones and Kirsanow.

A discussion and vote on the briefing report entitled the federal role in enforcing religious freedoms in prisons led by Commissioner Kirsanow.

And, last but not least, we're going to hear from the Staff Director for the Staff Director's report.

II. BUSINESS MEETING

A. DISCUSSION AND VOTE ON FY 2025 TOPIC FOR USCCR

BRIEFING REPORT ON MENTAL HEALTH JUVENILE JUSTICE

CHAIR GARZA: Our first order of business is a discussion and vote on the concept paper for the fiscal year 2025 briefing report topic on juvenile justice and mental health. I move that we adopt this concept paper, do we have a second?

VICE CHAIR NOURSE: Second.

CHAIR GARZA: A motion has been made and properly seconded, is there any discussion? I'll take a point of privilege and just make a few comments about why I brought up this topic. Mental health in juvenile facilities is a pressing civil rights issue, and the federal government has an obligation to provide for the basic needs such as food, medical care, and a safe environment for youth that are housed in these facilities.

It is deeply concerning that the majority of confined youth, many with untreated mental health needs, face environments that exacerbate trauma rather than promote rehabilitation. The Texas Advisory

Committee's report highlighted the stark reality that in Texas nearly 70 percent of youth in their juvenile justice system have moderate to severe mental health needs.

Following the deeply troubling findings

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1	shared by our Texas Advisory Committee, I believe our			
2	Commission should take up a more expansive view of the			
3	matter. It is heartbreaking to hear how many young			
4	people in confinement already grappling with mental			
5	health challenges are placed in environments that			
6	worsen their trauma instead of fostering healing and			
7	rehabilitation.			
8	So, that's why I ask for your support in			
9	investigating youth confinement to understand how the			
10	civil rights of this vulnerable group can better be			
11	protected. Is there any other discussion from other			
12	Commissioners?			
13	Okay. Hearing none, we'll proceed to a			
14	roll call vote. Please respond with yes if you are in			
15	favor, no if you are opposed.			
16	Vice Chair Nourse?

Commissioners Jones and Kirsanow.

COMMISSIONER JONES: I'd like to say a few words, unless Commissioner Kirsanow would like to start.

COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: No, go ahead, Commissioner Jones.

COMMISSIONER JONES: To my fellow

Commissioner Kirsanow, I want to thank him for his

collegiality, and for his partnership on this very

important topic of studying the rise in antisemitism

in America's college and university campuses, in

particular since the just terrible events of October

7th, 2023. The project of combating antisemitism is

about as personal for me as it can get for someone who

is not Jewish.

When I was in Congress I was proud to represent one of the largest Jewish communities in the country, and I have just witnessed the pain that members of the Jewish community have been feeling since the events of October 7th. There has been voluminous public reporting on the horrific experiences of Jewish students on college and university campuses in this country.

And as recently as yesterday there was an article in the associated press, which got republished in the Washington Post, about how a number of colleges and universities are settling these cases in advance of the incoming administration. This report is going to study a few things. It's going to look at how the Office of Civil Rights and the Department of Education has responded to claims of antisemitic incidents on college and university campuses since October 7th.

It is also going to look at how the Department of Justice has responded to those claims. We are going to look at the trends historically, what were the allegations prior to October 7th on a yearly basis, and how that data has changed since those events. We are also, lest there be any confusion, going to prioritize a diversity of viewpoints when it comes to this really controversial topic of what has been happening on college and university campuses.

One of the things that we are already looking at is the difference between speech that is protected, obviously, and that which is illegal under Title 6 for example, of the Civil Rights Act. And I'm looking forward to continuing along on this bipartisan path that we have already charted.

I want to thank my special assistant for

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all of the tremendous work that she has done in collaborating with Commissioner Kirsanow's special assistant, and obviously stakeholder organizations, and individuals who have expressed interest already in this important topic, and I think the times call for this investigation. So, with that said, I urge a vote of yea from everyone.

CHAIR GARZA: Commissioner Kirsanow, would you like to make any comments?

I think Commissioner Jones covered the landscape on this very well, and I'd like to thank him for his leadership on this issue, I concur with everything he has to say on this. We drafted this paper in response to a request from bipartisan members of Congress.

This is a topic I've been concerned about for many years, I've become even more concerned since the aftermath of the Hamas attacks in Israel on October 7th of 2023.

I'd also like to thank Congressmen

Auchincloss and Kiley and their fellow signatories for urging the Commission to conduct an in-depth investigation of this issue. And I look forward to a unanimous vote on this.

3	CHAIR GARZA: Our next order of business
4	is a discussion and vote on the briefing report
5	entitled the federal role in enforcing religious
6	freedoms in prisons led by Commissioner Kirsanow.
7	I move to adopt the briefing report led by
8	Commissioner Kirsanow. Do we have a second?
9	COMMISSIONER GILCHRIST: Gilchrist,

. 6	Commissioner Kirsanow, if you'd like to
.7	say a few words?
. 8	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: I think this was
9	a very, very interesting, and timely matter that was
20	addressed by the Commission in a bipartisan fashion.
21	I really approve, appreciate the input of all
22	Commissioners on this. I really don't have anything
23	more to say. I want to thank my special assistant for
24	everything she's done on this issue, and again, thank
5	you to all the other Commissioners

CHAIR GARZA: Great, okay. Well, I do want to just extend an additional thank you to the Office of Civil Rights Evaluation for their hard work on this report. There is a lot of effort, and a lot of minds that go into creating these reports, but I do want to say a special thank you to Commissioner Kirsanow for bringing this topic up.

Again, I think it's incredibly important to discuss these issues, and how people are impacted during incarceration. I see Commissioner Magpantay would like to say some comments.

COMMISSIONER MAGPANTAY: Yeah, I just wanted to applaud my colleague and the staff for this tremendous report. Just reflecting back on some of the hearings, what I was so shocked and dismayed about was that prisoners were unable to obtain religious texts during their incarceration. That the Bible, the Torah, the Quran, the Vedas were items that people could not read, even though we're a country that allows people to practice the religions to look at it.

I see religion as part -- some of the witnesses said that religion was part of the rehabilitative aspect, and we were hoping that we could do that. So, I'm glad that we spotlighted this issue of the inaccessibility of religious texts. This

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is something that is very important to me, and I think of concern, and I'm glad that we reviewed that in the report, and then the investigation. Thank you so much.

CHAIR GARZA: Thank you, Commissioner

Magpantay. With no other comments we can go -- sure,

Vice Chair Nourse.

VICE CHAIR NOURSE: Thank you so much. I just want to say one thing, OCOE has been delightful to work with. I was a bit concerned at certain points that the current changes in religious freedom on the Supreme Court were not recognized in the report, and they were very tolerant of my, yes I am a law professor, legal lectures, thank you very much.

9	D. MANAGEMENT AND OPERATIONS
10	STAFF DIRECTOR'S REPORT
11	CHAIR GARZA: Well, we're turning to our
12	last item on the agenda, it is a report from our Staff
13	Director, Mauro Morales. I'm going to turn the floor
14	over to you to give us your report.
15	MR. MORALES: Thank you, Madam Chair, and
16	congratulations on an exceptionally productive meeting
17	today, as they all are. But thank you, more
18	importantly, for allowing me a few moments to say
19	goodbye as I exit the Commission. This meeting ends
20	my tenure as the Staff Director of the United States
21	Commission on Civil Rights. The past ten years have
22	been the highlight of my professional career.
23	It's my distinct honor to have worked with
24	dedicated Commissioners, every one of you, committed
25	special assistants, all of you, and of course an

exceptional professional staff that works for the Commission. Together we contributed to a proud 68 year legacy of the Commission on Civil Rights as the conscience of the federal government.

I've never been prouder of my association with a group of professionals dedicated to preserving civil rights. I will always cherish the support and assistance provided to the Commission in raising the national awareness of ongoing civil rights challenges. I know much remains to be done, but I'm confident that you'll continue to carry out our mission in the finest tradition of federal service.

Pursuant to the request of the chair I created an exit memo that was added to the Commissioners' folder yesterday, and I'm sorry I wasn't able to produce it sooner. Some key highlights in the memo include that the USCCR in the past decade has held over 100 Commission business meetings, including telephone communication meetings.

And also during two years the offices were closed during the pandemic. I will say with pride that I attended every single one either in person or virtually. Thirty-three Commission reports have been published and sent to Congress and the President.

These also included three that were field briefings

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that many of you attended, and some did not who were unable to, or weren't here yet.

They were in North Carolina, New York, and San Juan, Puerto Rico. And I encourage, depending on the budget, continuing to do field briefings when possible. They allow the Commission to go out, and be seen by the public, and to hear from the public, and that's an incredibly important component of what the Commission does.

We've held 2068 State Advisory Committee
Act planning meetings. There were 391 fact finding
meetings to hear testimony on various topics by the
state advisory committees. There were 96 state
advisory committee chairs that came before the
Commission here and reported during business meetings
on their briefings, memoranda, or findings.

And, finally, Congress requested the Commission to create advisory committees in the five U.S. territories, and those have all been fully authorized, and have members. So, with that, I ask, and submit the memorandum for you, Madam Chair, and I thank you all for your dedication and commitment, and I thank you for your partnership, all, in leading USCCR. Thank you, Madam Chair.

CHAIR GARZA: Thank you, Staff Director

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Morales.

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MR. MORALES: And I'd ask if the memo could be put in as part of the record.

CHAIR GARZA: Yes, so noted, the memo will be a part of the record for this meeting. I just want to take a point of privilege, and just say how grateful I am for you, Staff Director Morales, for the service that you have given not just this Commission, but for the broader movement for civil rights, and for this country, the service that you have given to this country.

I've only had the pleasure of knowing
Staff Director Morales for a few years, but I had the
pleasure of going to a goodbye party for him earlier
this week, and your leadership speaks for itself.
Your staff admire and respect you, I think that that
speaks volumes about who you are, and what you've
contributed, and I'm eternally grateful for the
support that you've given me personally, but also to
ensuring that this Commission can continue on its
legacy.

MR. MORALES: Thank you, thank you.

CHAIR GARZA: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER GILCHRIST: Madam Chair, if
I may take a point of personal privilege as well?

1	CHAIR GARZA: Yes, absolutely,
2	Commissioner Gilchrist.
3	COMMISSIONER GILCHRIST: So, Mr. Staff
4	Director, we certainly wish you well on your future
5	endeavors. I remember when I came to the Commission,
6	I came in the midst of COVID, so most of our meetings
7	at that time were virtual, and I always saw you on the
8	camera. But when I came to Washington to meet you, I
9	was astonished that you were so tall when I walked
10	into your office.
11	But I certainly remember that when we had
12	the opportunity to converse, you were very helpful to
13	me as I was trying to figure out my role, and what I
14	would be doing here with my colleagues on the
15	Commission. So, I want to thank you for that, and
16	thank you for your leadership. I think you will go
17	down as one of the longest serving staff directors on
18	the Commission. So, we certainly thank you for your
19	leadership, God speed, and wish you well.
20	MR. MORALES: Thank you, sir.
21	COMMISSIONER JONES: Madam Chair, if you
22	don't mind?
23	CHAIR GARZA: Yes, of course, Commissioner
24	Jones.

COMMISSIONER JONES: I can't believe two

years have flown by so quickly, and I'm enormously grateful to you. From the beginning of my tenure on this body, and helping me on board, and just frankly being a voice of reason, I've made a lot of noise at times, I know it's not been easy to be the staff director. At times there has been a lot of contention, but you have remained level headed, and you've kept this Commission afloat.

And I know from conversations with staff that they also greatly appreciate your leadership, and your kindness, and your patience, and your passion for the work that we've been doing on this Commission, and frankly that you've been doing for a lot longer than I've been doing. We're going to miss you, and I know that you've already left a great legacy here, but I can't wait to see what you do next.

I know that this work is not the kind of work that people give up after a few years. It's the kind of thing that motivates you to keep pressing on, and certainly the challenges that we've been dealing with persist in many respects. So, thank you for your leadership, thank you for your friendship, and thanks for everything you've done to make this Commission a success. Thank you.

CHAIR GARZA: Commissioner Magpantay?

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because I've been on the Commissioner for over 30 years, and I've known, and am actually friends with former staff directors who haven't stayed as long for various reasons. And, Mauro, I'm delighted, surprised, and curious how you weathered so much of it, but I think it goes to your character, and your ability, you're great. Thank you so much for all of your support, and everything that you have done.

MR. MORALES: Thank you.

CHAIR GARZA: Thank you. Do you want to -- Vice Chair Nourse?

VICE CHAIR NOURSE: I just want to say ditto. That you held the Commission together during COVID, I have some experience with trying to hold classes during COVID. It was quite difficult, and we all thank you for your perseverance, this is not easy work. And you quoted Martin Luther King in a recent message about this, and it is important work, it is not work that happens in a day.

And so the tenure of your service, I think speaks to not only your talent and abilities, but your commitment, and I very much appreciate that personally, thank you.
