Dear Friends of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights:

In May 1939, the MS *St. Louis* sailed from Germany to Cuba, carrying 937 refugees — almost all Jewish — fleeing Nazi persecution. After the ship was turned away by Cuba, with only a small number of refugees disembarking, it proceeded toward the Florida coast. However, the United States also turned the ship away, sending 907 passengers back to Europe. While several European countries accepted the refugees, hundreds later perished in concentration and internment camps or while hiding and fleeing from the Nazis.
